Harold Thune, nimble sophomore from Murdo, S. D., has a big assignment tomorrow night when the Gopher basketball team invades Chicago to meet the Maroons.

Coach Dave MacMillan indicated) today that he would count heavily on Thune at forward. Thune's play at forward against Wisconsin Monday almost cinched the varsity post for him.

Thune will replace Max Mohr, junior letterwinner from St. Paul, who became a first-stringer when Don Smith was injured.

Don Carlson, star sophomore forward, will shoot again at Johnny Kundla's individual Minnesota conference scoring record of 116 points. Carlson came within an ace of tying it last Monday by scoring 18 points against the Bad-

GOPHERS TRIP

Reprinted From Yesterday's Late Edition. Iowa City, Jan. 6.—Minnesota's small but smooth playing sophomores opened their Big Ten basketball season here tonight by defeating Iowa, 42 to 34.

Off to a slow start in which Iowa piled up a 15 to 5 lead in the first 10 minutes the Gophers came back with a sharp rally that tied the score at 15-all in the space of a few minutes and then after being held to an 18 to 18 half score. spurted to a 28 to 20 margin early in the second period and kept the game under control in the face of intermittent Hawkeye rallies.

Once back in the ball game the speedy cagers of Dave MacMillan were too deft and too steady for the Hawkeyes, building up their lead late in the game by semistalling tactics that drew out the defense of the desperate Iowans and broke Gophers into the clear for setup shots.

Leading the Gophers tonight were a pair of sophomores, Don Carlson and Stu MacDonald, and a sharpshooting junior guard, Fred Anderson, who was high man for the MacMillanmen with six field goals for 12 points. Carlson tallied nine and MacDonald six on three buskets.

It was MacDonald's long range sniping that sparked the first half rally while Anderson turned on the basket heat in the rush that put the Gophers ahead to stay early

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
